Protect Your Skin This Summer

Many people describe sun-tanned skin as a "healthy tan", but nothing could be farther from the truth. There is no such thing as a safe tan!

Skin cancer attacks one out of every seven Americans each year, and one American dies from the disease every hour. Exposure to the sun causes over ninety percent of skin cancers in the United States. Any type of suntan constitutes sun damage caused by exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun. Other types of sun damage include wrinkles, age spots, freckles, tough or leathery skin, dilated blood vessels, sunburn, and skin cancer.

The sun emits two kinds of UV radiation: UVA which causes aging, and UVB which causes burning. Both UVA and UVB rays are undetectable to a person sitting in the sun; one cannot feel them on their skin and both may be just as damaging on cool, cloudy days as they are on clear, sunny days. In addition, both types of radiation cause skin cancer.

Skin cancer is the uncontrollable growth of abnormal cells in a layer of the skin. Over ninety percent of all skin cancers develop on skin that has been exposed to the sun, as sun damage builds up over the years and results in skin cancer.

The two most common types of skin cancer, basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma, are easily treated if caught early, and are rarely fatal. Basal cell carcinoma usually appears as a red patch, a shiny bump, or an open sore that does not heal. Squamous cell carcinoma usually arises as a scaly patch or a raised, wart like growth. The most dangerous form of skin cancer, malignant melanoma, looks like a mole-like patch with an irregular shape. Malignant melanoma is most often found on the legs of women, and on the trunks, especially the backs of men.

Everyone has a least some risk of getting sun damage and skin cancer, because everyone is exposed to the sun. People are most susceptible when they are exposed to sudden, short bursts of sunlight while vacationing in places where the sun is very strong, such as locations near the equator or at very high altitudes.

The easiest way to prevent skin damage and lessen your chances of getting skin cancer is to avoid getting sunburn.

Here are a few tips to help keep you

- 1. First and foremost I'd like to thank the delegates in attendance at the convention who represented over 27,000 members. It was obvious that they read the information they received prior to the convention and came prepared to act upon the business as presented.
- 2. Once again the NSS will take "the road less traveled" and move into a new governance structure as outlined in the bylaws adopted by the delegates at this convention and approved by the PA Insurance Department. Work on revising the bylaws began over a year ago and involved a Board Bylaw Committee, the Board of Directors, our Legal Counsel, road trips to our Regions, the PA Insurance Department and the Convention Bylaw committee. Thank you to all involved in the preparation of the new bylaws as much work was required. I also extend my gratitude to the convention delegates for adopting a new governance structure. You have strengthened the NSS and ensured its existence for future generations.
- 3. With the adoption of the new bylaws and governance structure the Board of Directors will see some changes. There will now be 9 National Directors. From the nine, one will be elected, from amongst themselves, to become the Chairman of the Board and work closely with the President in the leadership of the society. More information to come in future articles.
- 4. Through the generosity of the delegates, donations presented at the convention to benefit the PVR Scholarship Fund and the NSS Heritage Museum totaled \$18,429.07. A special mention



is needed here as Assembly 0065, Chicago, IL, donated \$10,000 to the PVR Scholarship Fund for a perpetual scholarship. We are grateful for this donation however sadly, Assembly 0065 has decided to disband. Thank you to President Mildred Mendel and the Officers of Assembly 0065 for helping to support the education of our youth and for your many years of dedication to the National Slovak Society of the USA and it's members.

- 5. The Convention Fund Raiser benefiting the Wounded Warrior Project was a huge success. Through the generosity of our Assemblies, Regions, Members, Families and Friends \$3,000 was collected.
- 6. Thought you might like to know the attendance at the convention. There were: 206 Delegates representing 36 Assemblies and 6 Regions, 16 Fraternal Guests, 6 NSS Advisors and over 75 Other Guests totaling close to 300 convention participants.
- 7. While supplies last we have copies of the 36th Quadrennial Convention Book, the "Pamatnica" available for purchase. safe in the sun:

- * Stay out of the sun between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.
- * Wear clothes with tightly woven fabric and a hat that shades your face, neck and ears.
- * Wear sunglasses whenever you are out side to avoid developing cataracts and damaging your retina.
- * Use sun screen that has at least SPF (Sun protection factor) 15 protection. Apply it continually every day especially on your lips. SPF 15 sun screen allows you to stay outside fifteen times longer than without sun screen. However, at that point applying more sun screen will not help; your skin will simply burn. Also note that SPF 30 sun screen offers only three percent more protection than SPF 15.
- * Avoid using tanning beds. They are just as damaging as the sun.
- *Carefully protect children from sun damage. Two-thirds of skin damage will occur before age fifteen.

Avoiding excessive sun exposure and sunburn is the best way to protect yourself from sun damage and skin cancer. Routinely inspect your skin for any changes. If you suspect that a spot on skin is new, or has changed color or appearance consult a dermatologist. Ninety percent of all skin cancers can be cured if detected and treated in time, but practicing preventive techniques is the best way to avoid it altogether.

Seventeen times the Money

Have you ever looked at the difference between a bank CD and NSS annuities?

For the fourth week in a row, the average national one year CD rate is 0.3%. We are a little below average in the Pittsburgh region but here are some of the best CD rates in the Pittsburgh area:

Dollar Bank 0.2% PNC 0.2% First Niagara 0.05% First Commonwealth 0.15% Citizens Bank 0.05%

Now when you look at the facts, PNC has one of the better rates listed. So if you had \$10,000 in a CD with them at 0.2% interest you would earn \$20 for the year.
