

The Three Buckets

Quite often people make financial planning out to be a complicated process that requires a computer, expensive charts and graphs. Or we think that this is something that only rich people need to do. The truth of the a few of them have been awarded the matter is we all need to do financial planning. There are several facets to planning including: goals & objectives, implementation, taxes, investments, savings, reviews, legal and maybe more.

Here is a real simple idea for planning. Use the three bucket approach. Each bucket to be titled; now, soon and later. The criteria for each bucket is when the money may be needed. The balance of the money can go in the "later" bucket and might be used to fund a traditional IRA or an annuity.

The "now" bucket, because of how quickly the money may be used, is probably best suited for a savings, checking or a money market account. The interest earned on short term funds Colgate (toothpaste), Ames (tools), will be less than otherwise obtainable but that is the price to be paid for

liquidity.

The "soon" bucket might be well suited for a Roth IRA. Money in this account will earn a competitive rate of interest. Roth IRAs have some liquidity features and tremendous tax free proceeds in the long run.

The "later" bucket is for long term money. This one might use an annuity or a traditional IRA. Both would provide our military, Blessings in a Backpack competitive interest, tax deferral and long term growth.

A percentage allocation may change depending upon a person's age, amount of savings or what particular goals they would like to accomplish. Taxes are always a consideration and should be factored in to a plan. Safety of principal, ease of doing business and risk tolerance are other items to contemplate.

April, 1895

Four new assemblies were organized in April, 1895. Assembly 191 was organized in Syracuse, New York; Assembly 192 was organized in East Helena, Montana; Assembly 193 was organized in Star Junction, Pennsylvania; and Assembly 194 was organized in Green Point, New York.

April, 1959

In the Second Annual National Slovak Society Bowling Tournament, Al Zbin of Assembly 432 captured the Men's Singles Championship with a score of 688.

April. 1979

The National Slovak Society kicked off the 90th Anniversary Loyalty Membership Drive to help celebrate the 90th Anniversary of the Society. The campaign ran from May 1, 1979 through April 30, 1980. Prizes were awarded to the top five producers.

April, 1989

Assembly 4 held its 25th Anniversary Bowling Jamboree at Yorktown Lanes in Parma, Ohio. Over 200 participants took part in the event.

Easter Bunny Container for Treats

Instructions

Materials

Glass or plastic jar Easter candies Googly eyes Pink pom pom Candy cups

Tools

Scissors Hot glue and glue gun Q-tips



The first step is just to fill the jar you have selected with the candy you have chosen.



Next, you will need some candy cups. Using your scissors, you need to cut out the shapes of the bunny's ears and feet.



The ears need to stand up on top of the bunny's head.

To make this happen, make sure that you have little tabs on the bottoms glue the pom pom as the bunny's nose. of the ear shapes which you can fold perpendicular to them. That way you can put glue on the bottoms of the tabs to attach the ears to the jar, and the ears will stand upright.

Turn the jar upside-down so that the cap is at the bottom. Now use hot glue to attach the ears to the top as previously described. Then hot glue the feet to the bottom.



You are now ready to make the bunny's facial features.

Using your hot glue gun, attach the googly eyes, spacing them as you see




Then get the two Q-tips and crisscross them before hot gluing them in place as the bunny's whiskers.

On top of them in the center, hot Voila! You have turned a jar into a cute bunny candy container for Easter!




Notes

Slovakia Easter **Traditions**

Easter in Slovakia is as important as Easter in the other countries of Eastern Europe. Traditions dating to the pre-Christian era survive today, albeit in a modified form, and people who grew up with these traditions have opinions about their merits and disadvantages. So how do people in Slovakia celebrate the Easter holidays?

Easter Meal

Though the more exciting tradition appears the day after, first celebrants of Easter must enjoy the Sunday dinner.

This extensive meal includes various traditional dishes, often including ham and the potato salad so common for the holiday feast. Some families also eat sandwiches, lamb, and some type of soup. An unusual "cheese" made from eggs may also appear on the taken to greater extremes in the past, feast-day table.



Of course, dessert and pastries are an integral part of the Sunday dinner. Paska is the traditional sweet Easter bread made with raisins, sugar, flour, eggs, and yeast and braided into a circular form to create a central decorative piece that can be consumed after it is admired by everyone present. Babovka is a type of cake somewhat lighter in texture than paska that often appears at holidays, including Easter. However, cookies and other types of pastries are also often offered to end the meal—preparations begin days before, so the person responsible for feeding the family may begin baking well in advance of Easter day to make sure that both savory and sweet categories are generously represented.

Typically, some type of spirits is drunk for the Easter meal, including wine or hard spirits. Some of these spirits, such as fruit brandy are similar to other alcoholic beverages in Eastern Europe. However, a type of gin called borovic"ka, may also be drunk.



Whipping and Pouring Water

The most beloved/hated traditions surrounding Easter in Slovakia involve whipping women and drenching them with water, both which occur on Easter Monday.

These traditions were probably but today they have dwindled to being merely a part of the "fun" of Easter . . . though fun for who is an unanswered auestion.

The whipping tradition stems from the fact that, in spring, trees grow new, young branches, representing vitality, strength, and flexibility—characteristics effigy of winter is drowned in a stream, that the male whipper hopes to impart upon the female whippee. The women's to arrive. A May pole celebrates spring legs are whipped, and in some cases, the whipper is rewarded with a ribbon that he ties around his whip to signify the number of victims he has bestowed with this particular honor. Today, sometimes (in the case of adults), a drink of alcohol or some money is given.

Splashing with, pouring over, or in extreme cases—dunking in water is another anticipated (dreaded?) ritual. While in the past a young lady might have been able to look forward to being thrown into the nearest stream, today this custom has been adapted so that it is less literal. Women may be splashed with water or even spritzed with perfume instead of having to run from men with buckets full of cold water or shrinking from other ways in which they would otherwise be completely drenched.



Easter Eggs

Of course, Easter eggs are an important aspect of Easter in Slovakia.

Wired eggs are a particular type of egg that differs from the batik-style or scratched eggs that appear elsewhere in the region, though the latter types of decorated eggs are common in Slovakia, too. These eggs are called kraslice. Sometimes they are given to boys in exchange for their whipping or dowsing with water, but chocolate eggs can also be used for this purpose. Eggs are used to decorate the house and as important symbols of springtime.

Other Easter Rituals

The Drowning of Morena, where an is a ceremony that encourages spring with brightly colored ribbons and Easter eggs. Seeds may also be sprouted prior to Easter in order to ensure that the house contains green growing things for the holiday.

The Easter market in Bratislava is one way visitors to Slovakia can enjoy some of the festivities surrounding Easter in Slovakia and take home holidayrelated gifts and crafts.




