How To Get Out Of Debt

Let's start with something simple. The secret of how to lose weight. The answer is eat less and exercise more. Less calories in and more calories burned will lead to weight loss. Well that was easy. How about getting out of debt. This one may be easy too. Earn more and spend less.

Okay, this is more complicated than it appears. One of the first things to consider is needs, wants, and desires. Not to make this a psychological discussion, but consider the differences. Needs - I need a car to get to work. Wants - all my friends have a new car I want one too? Desires- I want to buy a Mercedes and ride to work in style. Notice the fine difference in each of these statements. Everyone wants the Mercedes but do you really need it? Think about this difference before making the next purchase. Some experts even recommend putting off buying something for at least a week. Then if you still want it and need it, go ahead and buy it. Of course what happens during that week, or "cooling off" period, you may lose interest or have an epiphany, and decide not to purchase that item.

Here are a few more helpful hints to help with debt management. First, try to not use your credit cards. It is so easy to buy something instantly but then the bill comes in along with interest. Whenever possible use your credit cards wisely and pay off any balance each month.

If there is a large balance on a credit card here are a few ideas to try. One, pay off the card by using one of those zero interest card offers. Then work really hard to pay off that card since every payment will be going to principal. Another option would be to contact the lender and ask for some reprieve. They might surprise you and lower the interest rate being charged. Another idea is for multiple credit card balances. Find out which one has the highest rate of interest and then focus on that card. Put more money towards that one and then work on the next card and so forth.

Another idea is to pay extra money on any bill. You can do this with credit cards, auto loans, mortgage, etc. Any extra payment will help reduce the interest paid and shorten the time period of the loan.



PVR Scholarship

Important reminder! If you are a senior in high school, and will be attending college/trade school in the fall, please consider applying for the PVR Scholarship. In order to apply, you must be an NSS Life member, and have either a 10K whole life policy or a 5K annuity in place for at least 2 years with NSS Life. As long as the minimum GPA of 3.0 is obtained, \$500 will be awarded each year for a maximum award total of \$2,000 for 4 years. The deadline for 1st year applicants is May 1, 2020. ***The deadline for 2nd, 3rd, and 4th year student transcripts are due by July 15, 2020. Male bowlers with an average over 240 will receive no handicap and will bowl scratch in the tournament.

Handicap (Women) allowed will be 85% of the difference between 200 and last season's 2018-2019 who have no established average will use their highest sanctioned league average of at least 21 games as of March 15, 2020 Female bowlers who have no established aver age for this year or last year will be listed as 150 average and will be handicapped accordingly. If the bowler does not have a

sanctioned average over the last two years, but has competed in the Joint Fraternal Tournament, the most recent 5 year history from the Joint Fraternal tournaments will be used. Female bowlers with an average over 200 will receive no handicap and will bowl scratch in the tournament.

Under no circumstances will handicaps be increased after participant has bowled.

Contestants in this tournament are not required to report any tournament prize winnings for the previous 12-month period.

8. FALSIFYING AVERAGES – PENALTY - The team captain is responsible for reporting all averages of the individual team members, and they are responsible to him. - 18. Failure to use the correct average shall disqualify score if submitted average is lower than correct average thereby resulting in a lower classification or more handicap. Prize winnings shall be based on the submitted average if it is higher than the correct average. However, corrections in averages may be permitted up to the completion of the first game of a series.





Interesting Things about Easter You Never Knew

Today, Easter is all about egg hunts and chocolate bunnies. Here are just a few interesting facts where these traditions originated.

- 1. Eggs are dyed to represent the blood of Jesus Christ. In Orthodox and Eastern Catholic Churches, eggs are dyed red to represent the blood of Jesus, before being blessed and distributed to congregants. Now they're mostly just a fun way to celebrate the springtime season, especially with creative decorating ideas.
- **2 Most adults prefer milk chocolate to dark.** Adults are actually twice as likely to prefer the milky stuff, so keep that in mind if you're buying a sweet Easter surprise. Or try making a homemade treat instead.
- 3. **Good Friday is only honored in some states.** While Good Friday is a major holiday for all Catholics, only 12 out of the 50 states consider the Friday before Easter an actual federal holiday. Most of the country will go to work on Good Friday.
- **4. Giving eggs is a symbol of "rebirth" in many cultures.** The egg symbolizes new life, fertility, and rebirth in many places around the world. Thanks to the rounded shape, it's also been used as a symbol of the earth and our connection with nature.
- **5.** Americans will consume more than **16** million jelly beans. That's enough jelly beans to circle the globe not once, not twice, but **three times.**
- **6. Pretzels are linked to Easter too.** Supposedly, it's because the twists of the pretzel look like arms crossed in prayer. You can pay homage to the sweet treat and all it stands for by making these chocolate pretzel treats at home.
- **7.** Buying a new outfit for Easter stems from a superstition. Back in the mid-1800s in New York, people believed that buying new clothes to wear on Easter would bring them good luck for the rest of the year. And, lucky for us, the custom continues today. Meanwhile Easter bonnets are a relatively new concept in the U.S. Back in 1933, composer Irving Berlin introduced the Easter Bonnet into American pop culture with his ballad "Easter Parade." Today, it's still one of the most popular songs for the holiday.
- **8. World's largest chocolate egg was made in Italy.** The world's largest chocolate Easter egg was made in Italy in April 2011. It measured 34 feet and 1.05 inches in length, and weighed approximately 15,873 pounds.
- **9. Decorating eggs comes from a Ukrainian tradition.** The ornate eggs were called pysankas, which were made by using wax and dyes. It wasn't until Ukrainian immigrants came to the U.S. that the colorful custom caught on.
- 10. During medieval times, a very different game was played with eggs. Can you even imagine throwing an egg in church? Well, that's exactly what used to happen. The priest would throw a hard-boiled egg to one of the choir boys, he would continue to toss it to his peers, and whoever was holding the egg when the clock struck 12 was the winner and got to keep it.
- 11. The first White House Easter Egg Roll was in 1878. Rutherford B. Hayes was the president at the time. But it was President Nixon who first included a bunny in the festivities with a member of his wife's staff as the lucky person who got to wear the costume.
- **12.** Easter is the second biggest candy-consuming holiday. It comes in second only to Halloween, respectively. Americans spent approximately \$1.9 billion on Easter candy last year.
- 13. It used to take more than a day to make a marshmallow Peep. Approximately 27 hours, to be precise. That was back in 1953, when each candy was handmade with a pastry tube but today they have machines that have dramatically (!) sped up the process to just six minutes. Americans eat more than 600 million Peeps during Easter. This makes Peeps the most popular non-chocolate Easter candy. The Bethlehem, Pennsylvania factory makes an impressive 1 billion Peeps a year and 4 million a day.
- **14.** Most Americans bite off the ears of a chocolate bunny first. In fact, a whopping 76% say that's where they take their first mouthful, followed by 5% who eat the feet first, and 4% who eat the tail first.

"I Spy" in a Jar Craft

Once all objects are found, children can simply shake, the jar and begin the hunt all over again.

What you'll need:

- 1 clean, clear glass jar with a lid
- Enough rice to fill your jar
- (the type of rice is your choice)
- 20 small, colorful objects to place in your jar including decorative erasers, paperclips, seashells, dried pasta or beans, large beads, nuts, screws, bolts, small game pieces, buttons, marbles, little pictures or magazine clips, or any other small object your child wishes to put inside!
- Piece of cardstock (8 inches by 11 inches)
- A marker
- One sticky label (1 inch by 2 inches)
- Stickers to decorate (optional)









How to make your "I Spy" in a Jar Craft:

- Make sure that your glass jar is clean, dry, and has a VERY secure lid.
- Cut a strip off the piece of paper, and using the marker, write each of the twenty objects on the paper. Decorate, if desired. (See Photo) Set aside.
- Using the remaining paper form a funnel, place the funnel in the glass jar, and fill one-fourth of the jar with rice. Place the five largest colorful objects in the jar. Screw the lid on tightly and shake until the objects are covered in rice.
- Remove the top, and using the funnel, fill the jar halfway with rice. Place five more objects in the jar, screw the lid on tightly and shake until the objects are covered with rice.
- Once again, remove the lid, and using the funnel, fill
 the jar three-quarters of the way with rice. Place five
 more objects into the jar, screw on the lid, and shake
 until the objects are once again covered in rice.
- Take the lid off, and using the funnel, fill the jar with rice, leaving one inch of space at the top. Place the final five objects in the jar, screw on the lid, and shake until the objects are covered in rice.
- Take the label, write "I Spy" with the marker and place anywhere on the sides of the jar.
- If desired, decorate the lid and sides of the jar with stickers. Make sure you do not over-decorate the sides of the jar since you need to see the objects you are looking for.
- Your jar is now complete. Challenge a friend to see who can find the most objects!

Egg Carton Chicks

What You Need:

- One Paintbrush
- Googly eyes
- Orange paper
- Yellow paper
- Hot glue gun and glue sticks



- First, cut out two egg cups per chick. Make three chicks, so cut out six egg cups. Trim the cups down so that no connecting pieces are left. You'll be left with little circles of egg cup.
- Glue two egg cups together to make the chick's body. When the glue is dry, paint the entire body yellow. Use two coats of paint.
- While the paint is drying, cut out feet, a beak, and a little fringe of yellow paper that will become the chick's feathers. This represents the fluffiness of chicks and really added to the cute factor and prevented the head from looking as flat as it would otherwise. Glue the eyes, beak, feet, and feather tuft to the chick. When the glue dries, the chicks are ready!







Homemade Hand Sanitizer

Ingredients:

- 5-10 drops lavender essential oil
- 30 drops tea tree essential oil
- 3 Ounces rubbing alcohol
- 1 ounce pure Aloe Vera gel
- 1/4 teaspoon Vitamin E oil (helps soften hands!)

Instructions:

- 1. Add essential oils and Vitamin E oil to a small glass bowl or container and swirl to mix
- 2. Add alcohol to the oils and swirl again.
- 3. Combine this mixture with the Aloe Vera gel and mix well.
- 4. Shake gently before each use. (Sanitizer should last several months with the addition of Vitamin E and alcohol to help preserve.)
- 5. Transfer hand sanitizer to small, clean squirt bottles.

Also, use colored bottles so the essential oils are not exposed to light. **NOTE:** To make a hand sanitizer spray, simply use witch hazel instead of Aloe Vera gel.



Men also hit the women with wicker sticks to ensure vitality. This tradition is referred to as "Sibacka". Today, it's unlikely that young men have this goal in mind when they receive permission to act like little demons for a day. Girls are expected to give the boys a boiled egg or a candy bar as a thanks for being soaked with cold water.

I met a little rabbit once, A hopping on his way. I said, "Where are you going, on such a lovely day?" He said, with just the slightest frown, "Don't hinder me I pray! I'm taking round the Easter Eggs, Because it's Easter Day."
