PVR Scholarship Applications Available

This is a reminder to all 2020 High School Graduating Seniors that NSS is accepting requests for applications for the PVR Scholarships. The scholarship is for \$500 per year for a total grant of \$2,000. Below are the guidelines that you must meet in order to be eligible.

The student must be a member of the National Slovak Society (NSS Life) for a minimum of two (2) years prior to receiving a Grant. Membership will be verified by the Home Office.

The minimum amount of insurance required for eligibility is \$10,000 of a permanent life plan or \$5,000 in an NSS annuity. The insurance must be in force at the time of application and must remain in force through the scholar-ship period.

Please contact Pam Blum at 724-731-0094 or email her at pblum@nsslife. org to see if you qualify to request an application. Deadline for Applications is May 1, 2020. NO EXCEPTIONS.

Senior Member Scholarships

Just a reminder to our seniors that we have a fraternal program geared for you. If you take an adult enrichment class, we will pay $\frac{1}{2}$ of the tuition up to \$100.00. The purpose of the program is to encourage our older members to continue their education and make fuller use of their leisure time. Any life insurance or annuity member, fifty-five (55) years or older, who has enrolled and successfully completed a continuing education or adult education course is eligible. Members may submit up to two (2) applications in one calendar year. Vocational schools, community colleges and universities offer a variety of short-term courses which may include areas like computer training, cake decorating, photography, landscaping, small engine repair, ballroom dancing, to name a few. This program does not cover courses that assist you to maintain your current full or part-time job. (Example; We will not reimburse life insurance or real estate agents who take continuing education credits to maintain their licenses.)

National Slovak Society Privacy Notice

Introduction:

Recognizing the trust you have placed in the National Slovak Society/NSS Life ("NSS") regarding your private personal information, one of our foremost concerns is to maintain its confidentiality. In addressing that concern and in compliance with federal law set forth in the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act, NSS has adopted a comprehensive privacy policy applicable to our members' personal information and its use in our operations. In the context of this policy, any reference to NSS includes its affiliated entities, such as the PVR Scholarship Fund and the Heritage Museum, together with any directors, officers, employees, appointed medical examiner and/or legal advisor, or licensed agents of NSS or its affiliated entities.

Personal Information:

In your application for membership or the purchase of a fraternal benefit offered by NSS, you most likely provided us with non-public personal information about yourself, your family members, or your beneficiaries. This would include any information identifiable to an individual such as their name, address, age, date of birth, gender, social security number, or marital status. You may have also provided, either directly or by your written authorization, information pertaining to your finances, employment, health, medical treatment, or similar data that is private in nature and not available to members of the public.

Protecting Your Personal Information:

NSS maintains the utmost confidentiality regarding your personal information. Only those individuals in NSS having access to this information are those having a need to know in providing services to you, such as processing, administering or reviewing a transaction you have requested or initiated. In addition, each has been trained as to the do's and don'ts of our privacy policy and the importance of maintaining confidentiality.

Disclosure of Your Personal Information:

NSS does not sell any personal information to third parties for any reason. However, NSS may disclose your personal information where such disclosure is permitted or required by law. NSS may disclose your personal information to (i) a non-affiliated third-party business associate of NSS, such as business administrators, billing companies, or data processing companies who assist NSS in better serving you; (ii) a non-affiliated third-party involved in the processing, administering or enforcing a transaction on your behalf, such as responding to a request from a credit reporting agency; or (iii) a non-affiliated third-party to which a financial institution commonly makes such disclosures, such as attorneys, accountants, auditors, governmental regulators, and companies hired to assist in the prevention of fraud. However, in each case, those to whom the information is being disclosed are either bound by their own duties of confidentiality and nondisclosure or have entered into a written agreement with NSS by which they have agreed to abide by the NSS privacy policy, thereby maintaining confidentiality and prohibiting further disclosure of your personal information. Life Insurance Rates Going Up?

Say it isn't so, how could life insurance rates go up? Believe it or not we will be rolling out new rates this month and they are based on the latest mortality table (2017 CSO). Generally speaking, the rates for middle aged or older people has improved as this group continues to show gains in mortality. This decrease in cost can be attributed to the fact that older people are living longer. This may be attributed to greater access to health care, new advanced/experimental treatments, better prescriptions and enhanced physical therapy. Also, seniors are more active, making better food choices, exercising and overall enjoying a better quality of life. All of this is good news.

Who Wants to be a Millionaire?

Attention 2020 Graduating Seniors!

NSS is currently accepting requests for applications for the PVR Scholarships. The scholarship is worth \$2,000 made payable in \$500 installments over four years. Below are the guidelines you must meet in order to be eligible for the scholarship.

- 1. The student must be a member of the National Slovak Society (NSS) for a minimum of two years prior to receiving a PVR scholarship grant. Membership will be verified by the Home Office.
- 2. The minimum amount of insurance required for eligibility is \$10,000 of permanent whole life insurance, or \$5,000 in an annuity. The insurance must be in force at the time the application is received and be maintained throughout the scholarship period.

The deadline for applications is May 1, 2020



This Month in National Slovak Society History

Joseph Stefka, Jr. Chairman of the Board

January, 1970

District #10 staged its 10th Annual Spelling Bee and Holiday Party on January 4, 1970. The spelling bee was conducted by S.J. Hletko NSS Director of Activities. The winners of the Age 5-6 Division were Diane Barboras, John Tomaskovic, and Jimmy Nast who remained deadlocked and were declared co-winners. Joe Nast won the Age 7-9 Division. Eric Tomaskovic won his third straight title in the Age 10-12 Division.

January, 1970

Ann Buc and Bruno Budz captured the First Annual District #10 Mixed Twosome Tenpin Bowling Jamboree championship held on January 24, 1970, at Jay Bee Recreation Center. Sixty men and women bowlers participated in the event.

January, 1980

NSS President Joseph Stefka attended a White House Conference at the invitation of President Jimmy Carter on January 15, 1980. The conference focused on a newly formed Ethnic Affairs Commission. Also invited to the conference were other leaders of ethnic groups from across the United States.

January, 1980

Twenty-six people representing five Slovak fraternals met on January 200, 1980, to formulate plans to establish a Slovak Radio Club. The purpose was to make sure the Slovak language, culture, and heritage would be broadcast in the Pittsburgh area.



No Sew Sock Craft Snowman

Fill a plain white sock with rice, decorate this jolly snowman. Using a colored sock for a hat will keep him looking cozy.

What you need:

- 1 White sock
- 1 Sock in color for the hat
- Rice
- Rubber bands (or thread)
- Colorful buttons
- Ribbons
- Glue gun
- Markers or paint
- Orange pom poms



Start by filling your white sock with rice. You will need a hefty amount (we were quite surprised to see how much rice can go into one sock).

Once you are happy with the amount (and size) of your sock snowman tie the top with the rubber band.

Take another rubber band and place in the middle – more to the upper side – of the rice filled sock to form the head shape.

Now glue the buttons to the bottom side by using a glue gun (glue dots do a fairly good job too).

Draw the mouth and eyes with a black marker or with black paint.

You can also add pink cheeks (Crayola washable paints were great for the job). Make the nose out of two orange pom poms an it turns out amazing.

Add a ribbon for the scarf. Glue dots and a glue gun work best for ribbons, while other glues kind of fail miserably. You can cut off excess white sock (or you can tuck it in the hat.

Cut the colored sock (cut the foot part, without heel). Roll it a bit and place it on the head of your snowman. You can leave it as it is or you can secure it with some glue. Your sock snowman is ready to rock.

Snowflakes on a String

Items needed:

- Coffee filters; scissors; old newspaper; glue; paintbrush, iridescent glitter; white curling ribbon; and tape.
- Fold a coffee filter in half. Fold in half again then fold in half one more time
- Cut small triangles and half circles along the folds.
- Unfold the coffee filter to reveal your paper snowflake.
- Repeat steps 1 through 3 to make four other snowflakes.
- Place old newspaper on a flat work surface.
- Lay snowflakes over the newspaper and apply a light layer of glue with a paintbrush.
- Sprinkle on glitter then shake off excess on newspaper.
- Let snowflakes dry.
- Cut a 3 foot section of ribbon.
- Stretch ribbon across a table then line up snowflakes over the ribbon, positioned one underneath the under. Tape in place.
- Hang from a sliding door or long window to crate a snowy scene.

Popsicle Stick Snowman Magnet

What you'll need:

- Eight popsicle sticks
- Black paint
- White paint
- Paintbrush
- Scissors
- Tacky glue
- Magnet
- Two googly eyes
- Small piece or orange foam
- Five to eight gemstones



How to make your popsicle stick snowman magnet craft

Glue six popsicle sticks side by side. Attach a stick on magnet to the back of the glued sticks.

Paint the glued sticks approximately $\frac{3}{4}$ of the sticks white.

Paint the rest of the glued sticks black. Paint the remaining two popsicle sticks black and glue across the glued sticks where the black paint meets the white paint.

Glue google eyes under the two black sticks.

Cut a small triangle from orange foam to create a nose. Glue under eyes.

Glue gemstones onto two black popsicle sticks.

Dip the end of the paint brush (not the brush but the other side) into black paint and make a series of dots under the nose to create a mouth.









Cinnamon Roll Butterflies

Ingredients:

- 1 can (12.4 oz) Pillsbury
- refrigerated cinnamon rolls with icing
- 16 maraschino cherries with stems



Heat oven to 400°F. Spray cookie sheet with cooking spray. Separate dough into 8 rolls. Cut each in half crosswise. On cookie sheet, place 2 halves with rounded edges touching to form butterfly shape. Slightly flatten each "butterfly."








Bake 11 to 17 minutes or until golden brown. Remove stems from cherries. At top of each "butterfly" where "antennae" would be, make 2 small holes with toothpick; insert 2 cherry stems into

each roll. Remove lid from icing. Microwave icing on High 10 to 15 seconds or until of drizzling consistency. Drizzle icing over rolls; decorate with cherries. Serve warm.



Ten Incredible Facts About Animals Who Hibernate

As the cold sets in, we're beginning to bundle up, cook, and freeze massive casseroles, and spend long periods of inactivity marathon-watching television series online. Not surprisingly, our animal counterparts are doing the same. Okay, so the television-watching might be a stretch, but for some mammals and rodents in our Canadian forests it's time to bunker down for winter hibernation.


Here are 10 incredible hibernation facts of what it takes for some creatures to survive winter in the wild.

- 1. Animals can survive without oxygen while hibernating. During hibernation, an animal's body temperature drops, their heart rate lowers, and their breathing rates are reduced by 50 to 100 percent. (Yes, you read that right—100 percent.
- 2. Animals that are true hibernators wake up every few weeks to pass waste and eat. However, it's estimated that up to 90 percent of store energy reserves are used for these brief periods of alertness.
- 3. Arctic Squirrels can lower their body temperature to below freezing during hibernation. In one study, the rodents' body temperatures were recorded at minus 2.9 degrees Celsius, which may be the lowest core body temperature ever recorded in a mammal.
- 4. Hibernation can occur during the summer months. Known as "aestivation," this is a period of animal dormancy, usually by insects, reptiles, and amphibians, which occurs during dry months to retain water and conserve energy. Answers to Number Fill In Puzzle 5. Animals don't dream during hibernation. During their long winter sleep, an animal's body is too cold to produce the electric currents related to dreaming. The exception to this rule is the fat-tailed dwarf lemur, the only primate
- 6. You might have owned a hibernating animal at one point in your life. Both domesticated goldfish and hedgehogs hibernate.

known to hibernate. Unlike their rodent counterparts, they

enter long periods of REM sleep.

- 7. Bears don't hibernate. Unlike "true" hibernators, bears can be easily awoken from their winter lethargy and their body temperature doesn't drop substantially. However their heart rate does drop from 55 to 9 beats per minute and their metabolism is reduced by 53 percent. They also don't defecate or urinate all winter long, instead turning urine into protein.
- 8. Bears give birth and nurse their young while "hibernating." Wouldn't it be great to wake up from a deep sleep and to realize that the hard part was already over with?
- 9. Groundhog Day is actually a fairly accurate predictor of spring. Groundhogs wake up early from hibernation to get a head start on reproduction.
- 10. Hibernaculum is Latin for "winter quarters" and refers to where an animal hibernates, such as a den or cave. So the next time you're getting ready to spend your cold Friday Houses Made of... night at home watching Netflix, just tell your friends that you're "hanging out in your hibernacula."



January is National soup month. Soup has been a staple of Slovak tables for generations. Ring in the New Year with the hearty Kapustnica soup. (Sauerkraut soup)

Ingredients:

250 g of smoked meat, 200 g of klobasa, 500 g of sauerkraut, 10 g of mushrooms, 250 g of potatoes, 1 onion, 3 cloves of garlic, 1 bay leaf, 30 g plain flour, caraway, white and black pepper, red pepper, salt, marjoram, 800 ml water

Put the sauerkraut, meat, spices and dried mushrooms to cook in the water. When the meat is tender, remove it, thicken the soup with onion, red pepper and flour, add the smoked sausage and cook for about 20 minutes.

Shortly before cooking, season with garlic and marjoram. Cut the meat and sausage and put it back. Cook the potatoes separately.

majetok. Zato nesmie chýbať bravčové mäso, alebo pre istotu pečené malé prasiatko.

Podávala sa aj šošovica a jedlá s makom, pretože symbolizovali peniaze. Na Nový rok, 1. januára sa v minulosti tradovalo, aby si ľudia zabezpečili bohatstvo, prosperitu a úrodu, platil zákaz vstupu ženy ako prvej do domu.

Nič dobrého neveštil ani príchod starého chlapa oblečeného v kožuchu. V každom dome však boli vítaní malí chlapci – vinšovníci. Ak do domu prišil niekto cudzí, nesmel mať prázdne ruky a priniesť aspoň koláče, resp i peniaze, čo znamenalo, že prináša hojnosť a nie škodu.

Navyše musel zaželať: "Vinšujem vám šťastlivý nový rok, že ním dal Boh starý prežiť a nového dožiť!" Na nový rok musel v celej domácnosti vládnuť čistota a poriadok, aby tak bolo po celý rok.

Ženy chodili do kostola v bielom odeve, aby si zabezpečili úrodu pekného a vysokého ľanu. Niekde zasa v tento deň varili halušky, aby malo obilie veľké klasy. Smeti sa von nevynášali z obavy, aby v rodine nikto nezomrel, ale aj preto, aby sa z domu šťastie nevynieslo.

1. január - Deň vzniku Slovenskej republiky - oslavujeme ho od roku 1993, na počesť vzniku samostatnej Slovenskej republiky.

11 Beautiful Words That Will Make You Fall in Love

With the Slovak is the official language of just one small country in Central Europe and has a total of around six million speakers. Slovak is similar to Czech, as they both evolved from the western division of the ancient Proto-Slavic language. Although it's not necessary to speak Slovak to get by while visiting Bratislava, knowing some of these beautiful words could help you to win favor with the locals.

Krásny (kraz-nee) / Lovely

This incredibly important and frequently used word describes something or someone who is beautiful, lovely, wonderful, nice, or exquisite. You might have a krásny experience if you go skiing all day with your best friends at a mountain resort in the Tatra mountain range.

Kvietok (kiv-ee-tok) / Flower

The Slovak word for flower sounds lovely. Slovaks often give each other beautiful flower bouquets in celebration of their name day, when a person is celebrated on the day of the saint for which he or she was named. Many Slovakian people dream of having a garden; community gardens and small plots are very common, as well.

-ko or -ka (-koh or -kah) / My dearest

This is a diminutive suffix that is used as a term of endearment and is often attached to the end of a name. It is similar to calling someone "my dear." Someone with a friend named Andrej might call him Andrejko. A woman named Jana might have friends and family who use the –ka ending and call her Janka.

Dobrú chut (doh-brew-chooch) / Good appetite

This cute phrase is used before eating and means "good appetite" or "enjoy your meal." Slovaks and Czechs always wish each other "Dobrú chut" before eating, whether they're with close friends or near strangers.

Fujara (Fu-har-a) / Traditional woodwind instrument

The fujara is an important part of any Slovak folk music festival. Originally used by shepherds in Central and Northern Slovakia, today, learning the fujara is often a skill passed on from father to son. The fujara is on the UNESCO list of Masterpieces of the Oral and Intangible Heritage of Humanity. Listen to the fujara before visiting Slovakia so that you will quickly pick up on its unique sound at a summer folk music festival, such as the Pol'ana Folk Festival in Detva.

Láska (lah-ska) / Love

Láska is the Slovak word for love, and the endearing term moja láska, or "my love," is also frequently said. It's used in many song lyrics, from Slovak pop songs to traditional folk choruses.

Milujem ta (meel-u-yem ta) / Adoration

There is love, and then there is a higher level of loving that is described as close to adoration. Milujem ta is used to describe romantic love for a long-term boyfriend or girlfriend or a husband or wife.

Sedlák (seh-deh-lack) / Peasant

This word stems from Slovakia's history as a nation that heavily relies on agriculture. Additionally, the similar "Sedliak" is a common last name in Slovakia and refers to a family whose original profession was working the land. The word might also describe a person who comes from a small rural village to a city and tries to fit the image of a city dweller. The term gained in popularity when many Slovaks were forced to move from the villages where they lived and worked to communist cities from the 1950s to 1980s.

Zábava (za-bah-va) / Fun, amusing

Zábava means fun or amusing. Catching a summer music festival in Slovakia is certain to be zábava, as is rushing down the water slides at Tatralandia.

Štastný (ste-ash-nee) / Happy

Štastný means feeling happy. It's also a popular surname, as in the case of three famous brothers who played ice hockey in Slovakia: Marián Štastný, Peter Štastný, and Anton Štastný. Anton was the first person born and trained in Slovakia to be drafted in the NHL. He played for the Quebec Nordiques.

Milácik (mill-ak-zik) / Darling

Parents often call their children milácik, and partners often call each other milácik, many times husband to wife. In 2008, a Slovak sitcom called Ano, milácik, or Yes, darling premiered during mid-week primetime. Unfortunately, the funny show lasted only one season, but the phrase is still as popular as ever.

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
