

The Liberty Bell

Minutes of the 2020 Special Board Meeting

The 2020 Special Meeting of the Board of Directors was opened and called to order on Thursday, January 30, 2020 by Chairman of the Board Joseph Stefka, Jr. Director Katricak gave the opening prayer followed by Secretary-Treasurer/CFO Strom reading the roll call. All members of the NSS National Assembly were present via teleconference as well as Legal Advisor P. Ronald Cooper, Esq.

Chairman of the Board Joseph Stefka, Jr. asked for a motion to formally accept a Letter of Retirement, effective October 31, 2020 presented to the Board by President/CEO David G. Blazek. Director Wesnak moved to accept the Letter of Resignation, seconded by Director Gross. A Roll Call vote was taken at this time. Results of the Roll Call Vote: 7 Yes, 1 Abstention. Motion carried.

Taking turns, each Director and Legal Advisor Cooper reflected on President Blazek's leadership, accomplishments and then extended their good wishes on his retirement.

At this time Director Payerchin moved to nominate Joseph Stefka, Jr. as the next President of the National Slovak Society of the USA, seconded by Director Garbon. All Board Members followed with comments on the choice of Chairman of the Board Stefka assuming the role of President/CEO of the National Slovak Society. Chairman of the Board Stefka asked for a Roll Call vote at this time. Results of the Roll Call Vote: 7 Yes, 1 Abstention. Motion carried. Chairman Stefka was unanimously elected as the next President/ CEO of the National Slovak Society of

the USA. Chairman Stefka presented his personal comments on the Board vote selecting him as the next President of the NSS.

Chairman Stefka asked for a motion to move the Assembly Officers Seminar to March 2021 due to our venue at the Hilton Garden Inn at Southpointe not being available in November of this year 2020. Director Wesnak moved to hold the Assembly Officers Seminar in March 2021, seconded by Director Ondrejco. Motion carried. With motion and second, the Special Board Meeting was adjourned.

Minutes of the 2020 Winter Board Meeting

The 2020 Winter Meeting of the Board of Directors was opened and called to order on Thursday, March 6, 2020 by Chairman of the Board Joseph Stefka, Jr. He welcomed all present and turned the meeting over to President & CEO David G. Blazek. Director Katricak gave the opening prayer followed by Secretary-Treasurer/CFO Strom reading the roll call. There currently is a vacancy on the Board due to the resignation of Director Alan Burns to take a full-time position at NSS as its CIO. Sales Director Greg Felton was also present. Legal Counsel P Ronald Cooper was present via dial in call. The agenda was accepted with the ability to move items around.

Investments and Mortgages through 12/31/2019 were reviewed and approved. Also approved were minutes of the 2019 Fall Board and the 2020 Special Board Meetings. Fraternal Activities Coordinator Pam Blum reported on and reviewed upcoming activities. Director Katricak moved to accept the Fraternal Report as presented, seconded by Director Payerchin. Motion carried. Sales Director Greg Felton announced that the NSS is now the 10th LARGEST Fraternal (by Asset Size) moving up from its prior 12th position. Membership has grown to over 33,000 members. This year brought us 501 new members, 632 new Life and Annuity policies and 40 new agents just in the 4th quarter. Currently NSS has 1,852 agents making up our sales force. Director Payerchin moved for the adoption of the Sales Director's report, seconded by Director Gross. Motion carried.

Legal Advisor P Ronald Cooper presented his report via conference call. A discussion was held pertaining to 1099's and Pre-Need policy holders. Director Czarney moved to accept the Legal Advisor's Report, seconded by Chairman of the Board Stefka. Motion carried. AQS Managing Director Larry White presented the Investment Report. After presentation Director Katricak moved for the adoption of the report, seconded by Director Payerchin. Motion carried. The 2019 Year in Review was presented by Director Katricak using our 2019 Financial Statement for detail. Director Czarney accepted the report of our 2019 Year End results as presented, seconded by Director Garbon. Motion carried.

Under Old Busines President & CEO David Blazek reported that the NSS has received a BBB+ Rating from Kroll. After the document was reviewed it was found to have two editorial errors which will be fixed prior to final signature. After discussion Chairman Stefka moved to accept and publish the Kroll BBB+ Rating, seconded by Director Katricak.

The Assembly Officers Seminar will be rescheduled for 2021 and the ERM Framework discussion postponed. Director Wesnak moved to have CIO Alan Burns added as a member of the Enterprise Risk Management Committee, seconded by Director Czarney. Motion carried. The ERM Framework document will be revised accordingly.

President Blazek and Chairman of the Board Stefka each presented reports on the results of our PA Exam. President Blazek reported on the Vestibule remodeling that is expected to begin soon.

New Business began with acting upon Petitions received. They are: Prince of Peace Parish, Paul J Zatek - \$500; University of Ottawa, Mark Stolarik -\$500; and Beaver County YMCA -\$500. Motion carried.

Slovak Society of the USA, seconded by Director Garbon. All Board Members followed with comments on the choice of Chairman of the Board Stefka assuming the role of President/CEO of the National Slovak Society. Chairman of the Board Stefka asked for a Roll Call NSS Interest Rates remain the same for the 2nd Quarter of 2020. At this time Chairman of the Board Joseph Stefka, Jr asked the Board to enter in Executive Session. Executive Session began 2:25 p.m. and ended at 2:50 p.m. After coming out of Executive Session Director Wesnak moved to approve the Board's selection of Karen Lynne Orban, Assembly 0774, to fill the vacancy left on the Board due to the resignation of Director Alan Burns. Seconded by Director Payerchin. Motion carried.

In recognition of NSS Sales Director Greg Felton being selected as the Fraternal Societies of Greater Pittsburgh's 2020 Fraternalist of the Year, President Blazek discussed what the Board would like to present to Greg from the NSS. We are very proud of Greg and are grateful that he remains the NSS Sales Director. Thank you, Greg! With this, the meeting was adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

QCD - Qualified Charitable Donations from your IRA

As part of a permanent tax law provision, a person can make a charitable donation directly from their IRA by using their RMD. Previously a person would have to take their required minimum distribution, deposit the check into their account and then write a check to the charity. This has the effect of increasing your adjusted gross income. Then the tax deduction may or may not be available to you depending on a variety of other factors.

The QCD rules limit the amount you can give to \$100,000 per person per year. The money must go to a 501(c)(3) charity. Donations to a donor advised fund do not qualify. QCDs only apply to IRAs and not 401Ks and other plans.

With this direct payment to charity it is possible to give up money to your favorite cause and the RMD will not increase your adjusted gross income. Since we are touching upon the subject of taxes, NSS always recommends that you discuss these ideas with your tax advisor or CPA to see how they may affect your particular situation. There are some real savings advantages when using QCDs.

- People that take the standard deduction and don't itemize.
- Individuals whose Social
- Security income is not fully 85% taxable.
- There may be a savings when

itemizing deductions. For instance medical expenses are phased out by a percentage of your AGI.

- Depending on your income your Medicare payments may be increased if you cross a certain threshold. Using a QCD may help keep you under that amount.
- Savings for higher income taxpayers that may be subject to the alter native minimum tax.

These are all specific situations that may or may not apply to your situation. The important point is to be aware of the advantages of making a QCD. NSS recommends that you check with your tax professional to see how this idea may work in your particular situation.

In recognition of her academic success, she was inducted into the John F Kennedy-Dr. back several generations. Thomas Dooley chapter of the National Honor Society. She has consistently been named to the President's

Honor Roll. She is a member of several clubs that include the Latin Club, Debate team, Drama Club-stage crew, Go Green Club, and annual Walkathon Committee. Additionally, she served as Co-Chair/Chair of the Youth and Government Club & currently serves as Event Coordinator of the Multicultural Club, where she also organizes educational lectures & topics of discussion. She has played on the Varsity Softball team since Freshman year & serves as a peer tutor helping fellow students with writing and history.

Emily is a well-rounded young lady who engages herself at school and within her local community. She was a member of the Lower Naugatuck Valley Boy's & Girls Club Keystone Club. She served as a Counselor-in-training for the Lauralton Hall Summer Camp working with children in grades K-8 in the athletic & cooking groups. For the past 4 years she has volunteered with the Stratford Cat Project, an organization dedicated to the rescue of homeless and abandoned cats and kittens. In recognition of logging over 100 volunteer hours during the 2017-2018 school year she received the Frances Warde Award for Outstanding Community Service.

This past summer Emily traveled to Seicheprey, France to restore trenches used in World War I for the "Digging into History: Connecticut in World War I" international service project. This program was sponsored by the Connecticut State Library in conjunction with the American Legion and World War I Commission in recognition of the 100th anniversary of WW I. She was honored to be one of only 15 students chosen to take part in this prestigious program. The Connecticut students worked side by side with a group of 16 French students and a team of French & American historians and archeologists to restore and rebuild the original trenches used by the American and French soldiers. The hard work of the students gave back to the Village of Seichprey, established a memorial and preserved a part of the "World War I Trail". They resurrected and reinforced the bonds between the Village & the State of Connecticut. Emily was honored by her state & national government and received numerous awards from individuals such as Congressman Jim Himes, Senator Christopher Murphy, and the Connecticut General Assembly. Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro proposed a Congressional Proclamation detailing the program and recognized each student and their historical accomplishments. This Proclamation was filed in the Library of Congress and the Connecticut State Archives.

Emily is currently in the Emily is a member of NSS Assembly COO2 and is proud of her Slovak heritage. For veterans who are unable to leave their rooms, she provides a gift card so that no one is left out. While other VA hospitals have started to offer this, Mary's Santa Shop has been recognized as the model for others.

Mary looks for better ways to serve others. Seeing the need to properly serve those in the dementia unit, she stepped up to obtain the specialized training required to work in that unit. That door is now open to her to be able to bring the special little things into the residents there and most importantly spend time with those who are often overlooked.

The COVID-19 pandemic has not stopped her relentless volunteer efforts! She makes weekly trips to The VA hospital to meet the staff at the ambulance bay with supplies for the residents. When she heard how distraught the residents and their families had become with the absence of personal visits, she knew she needed to do something. Mary found a way to get the necessary funding and bought 5 electronic tablets that could be used to provide virtual visits.

On July 4th, we celebrate our nation's independence by lighting up the sky with fireworks. Follow these tips for a safe and enjoyable celebration with your family!

The display of bangs, bursts and sparkles are always a highlight of summer evenings, especially as our nation celebrates Independence Day. Fireworks are beautiful, but dangerous. Here are a few ways to help keep yourself safe.

Leave Fireworks to the Pros.

The best way to protect your family is to not use any fireworks at home. Instead, attend public fireworks displays and leave the lighting to the professionals.

Find a Substitute for Sparklers.

Little arms are too short to hold sparklers, which can heat up to 1,200 degrees. An alternative to sparklers can 2. be glow sticks. They can be just as fun, and they don't burn at a temperature hot enough to melt glass!

Take Necessary Precautions.

If you do decide to light fireworks yourself, be extra careful. Make sure you're not wearing loose clothing when handling matches or fireworks. Never use fireworks indoors. Outside, point them away from homes and people, and steer clear of brush, leaves, dry grass and flammable substances.

Keep Your Distance.

Make sure everyone is positioned far back from where fireworks are being lit. If a device does not go off, do not stand over it to investigate or re-light them. Instead, have a bucket of water nearby extinguish the dud!

Be Prepared for Problem.

Keep a fire extinguisher nearby and make sure you know how to operate it properly. When you're finished with the fireworks, douse the remains with a bucket of water before disposing of them to avoid a trash fire. Generally, fireworks have inherent risks that can bring catastrophic results, including unintentional fires. and protect yourself and your family.

Mini Marshmallow Shooters (or Pom Pom Poppers)

You'll need:

- 9 oz. plastic cups
- 12" balloons)
- imini marshmallows (or pom poms)
- scissors (not pictured)

Directions:

- 1. Cut the bottom part off of your plastic cup. It works best to double up the cups and cut off the bottom third. See how there's two cups nestled together?
- . Tie a knot at the end of your balloon and cut off about 1/2" from the other end.
