Gravy

Easy Cross Bird Feeder

Supplies: Pipe Cleaners and Cheerios







1. You will need 2 pipe cleaners. string Cheerios on both pipe cleaners, leaving about a 1/2 inch to an inch on both ends without cereal. Take one pipe cleaner and make a loop on one end, twisting the pipe cleaner to itself to create the loop.



2. Bring the other end up and twist it around the pipe cleaner. Lay this pipe cleaner to the side.



3. Twist the ends of the second pipe cleaner, leaving a little "wiggle room" within the cereal.



4. Press the pipe cleaner so that the twisted portion is in the "back" and the circle is "pinched" together.



5. Insert this pipe cleaner in the middle of the first pipe cleaner. Twist the ends of the second pipe cleaner around the them. You can place it on a short shepherd's hook out in back of the first pipe cleaner.



6. Press the fronts of the two pipe cleaners together, and wiggle the Cheerios so that the pipe cleaners sort of lock together, like a puzzle.

Done! Make several of them and see how fast the birds eat the yard, and within 24 hours the cereal will be destroyed.

Od kapusty chlapi husti

Koncom októbra a začiatkom novembra nastal čas na nakladanie kapusty do sudov, aby vydržala až do jari. Kapusta patrí v ľudovej strave medzi najrozšírenejšie jedlá a pestuje sa na celom územi Slovenska.

Z čerstvej hlávkovej kapusty sa varili privarky, dusenou sa plnili kapustniky. Vonkajšie listy a hlúbiky slúžili ako potrava pre domáce zvieratá. Kyslá kapusta bola jedna z hlavných surovín pri príprave jedál cez celú zimu až do neskorej jari. Varili sa z nej polievky (kapustnice), privarky, strapačky (halušky zo zemiakového cesta) s kapustou, udusená kyslá kapusta sa používala ako príloha k mäsu, ale aj ako plnka do koláčov. Kvasená kapusta sa často jedla aj surová—je totiž bohatým zdrojom vitaminú C, rovanako ako šťava z nej (kapustnica). Používala sa aj v ľudovej medicine, obklady z kyslej kapusty sa dávali na omrzliny, pomáhali pri vysokých horúčkach či pri bolestiach hlavy.

O kapuste sa vravelo: Kapusta sedem ráz prihrievaná je najlepšia.

O kapuste spievaju:

Kapusta, kapusta, jaka dobra bula, Zo staru slaninu, hojaja, čuhaja Zo staru slaninu, zapražena bula.
