NSS Net Admitted Assets increased to \$1,648,444,321, an increase of 13.6%. Surplus increased to \$80,941,812 an increase of 14.5%., and the solvency ratio increased to 105.17%. - Convention Planning has now entered Stress Mode due to the amount of work that needs to be accomplished in a brief period of time. We are doing our absolute best to make sure the Convention runs smoothly and the business of the Convention is successfully acted upon.

- 7. Just a reminder, as with prior Conventions, ALL reservations (Lodge, events, transportation, excursions) will be managed through the Home Office. Delegates ARE NOT to call the Hershey Lodge to make any kind of reservations. The staff at Hershey will not take reservations for our convention.

Scholarship For Senior Members A Fraternal Program

PURPOSE -

To encourage our older members to continue their education and to make fuller use of their leisure time.

MEMBER ELIGIBILITY -

Any life insurance or annuity member, fifty-five (55) years or older, who has enrolled and successfully completed a continuing education or adult education course. Members may submit up to two (2) applications in one calendar year.

COURSE ELIGIBILITY -

Vocational schools, community colleges and universities offer a variety of short-term courses which may include areas like computer training, cake decorating, photography, landscaping, small engine repair, ballroom dancing, etc. This program does not cover courses that assist you to maintain your current full or part-time job. (Example: We will not reimburse life insurance or real estate agents who take continuing education credits to maintain their licenses.)

PROCEDURE -

Members should enroll and pay for the course of their choice. Once the member has finished the class, they must submit an application, along with verification that the class was successfully completed, to the Home Office for approval by a National Officer. If the scholarship application is approved, the NSS will reimburse one-half (1/2) of the tuition for the course up to, but not to exceed, one hundred dollars.

The National Officers are the sole authority in any decisions regarding this scholarship program. Their decision is final in all cases.

Tax-deferral, What Is It?

Sometimes in this space we tout the advantage of tax-deferral. But what is tax-deferral? A good example would be any non-qualified deferred annuity that we offer. Depositing a \$100,000 into a Preferred 5 earning 3.0% interest means that at the end of one year, the account would be worth \$103,000. The annuitant/owner will not receive a 1099 statement from us assuming they left the money in the account and made no withdrawals. With no taxes being due, the account should continue to grow faster. Had that same money and interest existed at any bank, the account holder would have received a 1099 for the \$3,000 in interest. Depending on the tax bracket, this person might owe 25% in taxes on the \$3,000 or \$750. In this case the account would be worth \$102,250.

Here is a more extreme example of tax-deferral. Elon Musk is the richest person in the world with an estimated worth of \$250 billion. He owns Tesla and SpaceX. Both companies gave him stock options that were valued at \$23 billion and he owes taxes of \$11 billion on that amount. He had to sell some of his stock to get the cash needed to pay this tax bill. As a result, he became the largest single taxpayer in U.S. history. Elon certainly would have liked some tax-deferral in this particular situation. The old rule: tax-free is best. Tax-deferred is the next best thing. Taxable is the least desirable outcome compared to the three choices. We have products that could help you. A Roth IRA could be tax-free, an IRA is tax-deferred and

an annuity where the interest is taxed at withdrawal may all be used to help save money.

Spring time and gorgeous butterfly Make A Tin Can Windsock crafts go hand in hand

Temperatures are getting a bit warmer and our flower bulbs are beginning to make their slow appearance out of the ground. We can feel spring in the air! So below are instructions on how to make a beautiful butterfly.





Supplies Needed

- butterfly wings pattern (optional)
- Mixed Media (watercolor) paper
- liquid watercolors
- Neon Glitter Shakers
- Wooden Scoop Stick
- Wiggly Eyes

- glue
- pipe cleaners
- hot glue gun
- paint brush
- Shimmer Pom
- scissors
- Wiggly Eyes
- 1. Begin by drawing the butterfly wings pattern on your mixed media or watercolor paper. Use your liquid watercolors to paint the butterfly wings. When the watercolors have finished drying cut out your butterfly wings.
- 2. Add some fun lines and dot details to your butterfly wings with your school glue. Then shake neon glitter onto the glue. Shake off any excess glitter and set aside to drv.
- 3. Heat up your hot glue gun. For your butterfly body, grab a large shimmer pom and 4 medium shimmer poms and hot glue them onto the scoop stick. Cut two sections off Ladybugs from Egg Cartons your pipe cleaner, bend the ends down to make antennae and hot glue them behind the butterfly head. Then hot glue your wiggly eyes onto your large shimmer pom.
- 4. Finish your gorgeous butterfly craft by hot gluing the butterfly body in the center of the watercolor butterfly wings. (Photo above)

Tie Dye Easter Eggs

These eggs are made with supplies you probably have around the house. Two or three color combinations make the prettiest eggs, so be creative with their tie dye Easter eggs.

Supplies

- Hard Boiled Eggs
- Crayons
- Crayon Sharpener
- **Bowls**
- 1. Boil eggs.
- 2. Choose 2 or 3 crayons. Sharpen them over a bowl to save the shavings.
- 3. When eggs are still very hot, roll them into crayon shavings.
- 4. Let cool.

Supplies Needed:

- Clean Recycled Can (any size will work!)
- Acrylic Paint & Paintbrushes
- Glue (Elmer's Craft Bond Glue)

- After the paint is dry, use Elmer's Craft Bond glue to attach colorful ribbons to the bottom rim of the can. You can also add a ribbon to the top of the can for hanging.

- Empty egg carton cup
- Skinny black chenille 2 inch piece
- 2 small wiggly eyes
- 1 medium black pom pom
- Colorful acrylic paint
- Black acrylic paint
- Paintbrush
- White craft glue
- Hot glue gun
- Scissors



- 1. Use scissors to separate egg carton cups, trim the edges.
- 2. Paint egg cartons in desired colors and let dry.
- 3. Glue wiggly eyes on to black pom pom and let dry.
- Glue black pom pom on to side of egg cup with white craft glue and let dry completely, making sure eyes are facing out and are where you want them.
- Cut the 2 inch piece of skinny black chenille in half. Bend the end of each one to form the antennae. Use hot glue to attach antennae to pom pom head.
- 6. Use the handle end of a paintbrush to add black paint dots to the ladybug's back. Dip handle into paint and pick up a generous amount, then use a drawing motion to add the dot to the ladybug's back.
- 7. Let dry completely.





On Holy Saturday, Slovak people take baskets loaded with holiday foods to church for the traditional Easter blessing, which is a must prior to eating those exquisite foods. Neatly arranged in the baskets will be ham, slanina (bacon), chrin (beets with horseradish), salt, paska, kolbassi, hrudka (egg cheese), butter, pysanky, colored eggs for eating and kolachi. After the foods are placed in the basket, an embroidered cloth cover is placed over them, and a blessed candle is fastened upright near the basket handle. To take some of the mystery out of the preparation of the traditional foods, here are a few recipes.

HAM

The ham is decorated and baked according to your favorite recipe. How large a ham you buy and use depends on how many people you are serving. For a 20 pound ham; cut it in half, decorate the halves, bake them and place one of them in the basket.

CHRIN (Beets with Horseradish)

- 8 cans whole beets, drained
- 3 bottles horseradish (Do not use creamed horseradish)

Grind beets using fine grinder attachment. The juice can be saved for soup. Add horseradish to beets; mix well. Refrigerate. An empty horseradish jar (washed, label removed and dipped in boiling water to sterilize it) can be filled with the mixture and placed in the Easter basket. The jar's cap can be disguised with aluminum foil, thus hiding any advertisement.

Paska

- 3 cups scalded milk,
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 6 beaten eggs
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 cup melted butter
- 1/2 large cake yeast
- 12 to 14 cups flour

In a large bowl, combine milk, sugar, salt, butter and cool to lukewarm. Save 2 tablespoons of the eggs and add the rest of the eggs to the milk mixture. In a separate bowl, crumble yeast in water and let stand for 10 minutes. Add butter forms. Place sample of butter in to above mixture. Add flour - about 2 cups at a time - until the dough can be

handled. Knead on a floured board for 15 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, grease top and let rise in a warm place for about 1 1/2 hours.

1-1/2 quart enameled saucepans can be used for baking. Let rise. Brush tops with 2 tablespoons eggs to which some milk has been added. To achieve that glazed appearance on the loaves, brush tops several times prior to remov- • ing them from the oven. Bake at 325 degrees for about 1 hour.

NOTE: Before placing dough in pans, about 1 cup of the dough can be saved and shaped into designs (plaits, crosses, etc,) and placed on top of the unbaked paskas. These fancy shapes can be prevented from scorching in the oven by placing aluminum foil on top of the paskas during baking.

KOLBASSI

Again, the amount of kolbassi you purchase (or make), depends on how many eager eaters you are serving. Place the kolbassi in a pan, cover with water and boil for about 45 minutes. Some cooks, after the kolbassi is boiled, place a few into a baking pan and sprinkle them with about 2 tablespoons of brown sugar and honey. This is then popped into the oven for about 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool before refrigerating.

BUTTER

If you prefer not to use already prepared butter for the Easter feasting, the butter can be made by whipping heavy cream. Use either one pint or one half pint heavy whipping cream, place in bowl and mix with hand beater until a small fancy bowl and decorate for use two. Store tightly covered in the refrigin Easter basket.

(Cirak) Slovak **Easter Cheese**

This is traditional Slovak Easter cheese that is served Easter Sunday. It is served with baked ham and beet horseradish and is great on sandwiches.

- 12 eggs
- 1 quart whole milk
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon, or vanilla


Crack eggs into a large saucepan and beat with a whisk. Whisk in milk, sugar, salt and cinnamon. Cook over medium-low to low heat, stirring constantly until the mixture fully forms curds and the whey separates. This will take 20 to 30 minutes. Using higher heat or failing to stir will result in a big pan of sweet scrambled eggs.

Use a skimmer or slotted spoon to ladle curds into cheesecloth. Allow curds to drain for 10 minutes. Gather up edges of cheesecloth to form a bundle to drain as much whey as possible from egg cheese. Use a length of butcher's twine to tie cheesecloth containing curds into a neat bundle, pressing on cheesecloth a bit to help whey drain off. Tie twine to a wooden spoon or dowel, hang egg-cheese curds over a pot or container to collect any remaining whey and continue draining for 30 minutes. When egg-cheese ball has cooled and is not dripping any more whey, place it in the refrigerator overnight still suspended over a pan so it will retain its round shape. When ready to serve, remove cheesecloth.

This cheese is very perishable and should be consumed within a day or erator.

Our Customs & Traditions

One of the most solemn and ancient rituals observed by Slovaks the world over is the blessing of Easter foods. Early Sunday morning the girls and women prepare a basket of symbolic foods to be taken to church to be blessed and eaten to celebrate the great feast of Jesus Resurrection. Each basket is beautifully decorated and covered with a beautifully embroidered or crocheted cloth. A blessed candle is placed in the basket and lighted during the ceremony as a sign of "Christ the Light of the World"





<u>COLORED EGGS /MAĽOVANÉ VAJIČKA</u> Brightly colored and decorated the eggs are symbolic of Jesus Resurrection from the tomb on Easter Sunday; and of new life.

EASTER BREAD /PASKA This sweet, rich yeast bread is symbolic of Jesus the Bread of Life. The bread is often ornamented with a cross of dough in the center surrounded by a circle of plaited dough symbolizing the crown of thorns.

<u>PASTRIES /KOLAČE -</u> Specially baked holiday butter and egg rich pastries filled with fruits and nuts symbolizing the many gifts from God and the sweetness of the resurrection.

SMOKED HAM, SAUSAGE AND BACON/ ŠUNKA, KLOBASA, SLANINA- These meat products symbolize the sacrificial animals of the old testament and the sacrifice of Jesus. Ham was the most popular main dish meat because of its richness and symbolized the great joy and abundance of the Easter celebration. Spicy pork sausage with a garlic flavor is indicative of God's favor and generosity. A piece of smoked bacon cured with spices is added to remind us of God's overabundance of mercy toward us.

<u>EASTER CHEESE /SYREK/HRUTKA –</u> Made from milk and eggs and shaped into a ball this bland but sweet tasting cheese is to remind us that as Christians we should use moderation in all aspects of our lives.

HORSERADISH- CHREN- Represents the bitter herbs used by the Hebrews during their flight from Egypt, and the bitter herbs used during Jesus' final celebration of the Passover meal.

<u>BUTTER /MASLO</u>—Shaped into a lamb figure to remind us of the goodness of Christ that we should have toward all things.

<u>SALT/SOL</u> – Salt is blessed because it is a fundamental seasoning and preservative necessary to sustain life. It is also symbolic of prosperity and justice, for it is Christ who sustains us to eternal life.

Of course regional differences both here in America and in Slovakia may dictate other various additions such as wine, vinegar, or veal. Remember, since all the foods are blessed none is to be wasted.



One of the most prized possessions of many with roots in the Slavic countries of Eastern Europe is the Easter basket cover. These covers usually have symbols related to the Resurrection and the celebration of Easter. In many families, the cover is passed from generation to generation. The most common element found on Easter basket covers is the cross, the symbol of the resurrection. Pussy willows, and other spring flowers, as well as kraslice are also used in the designs. Quite often, the cover will carry the message of the resurrection in the language of the owner. Embroidery is the most common method used for making these covers, because many become family heirlooms. The design variations are quite extensive, and seldom will you find two embroidered covers that are identical. Each cover makes a unique statement about the owner's heritage and beliefs. If you are lucky enough to have an Easter basket cover I hope you will use it to cover your basket and continue this special custom.

Jedlá sú prikryté vyšivaným obrúskom. Kňaz vykonáva obrad svätenia s veľkou dôstojnosťou, okiadza tymianom nielen košíky, ale aj prítomných. Celý zástup obchádza tri krát, skláňa sa nad košmi, z ktorých medzi tým sňali obrúsky a kropí ich obsah. Po tretej obchôdzke zastane pred hlavným vchodom, kde pri improvizovanom oltári dokonči "Poblahoslavi" sa veriaci rýchlo rozchádajú, pretože ešte stále plati povera, ten, kto s jedlom prvý dobehne domov, najskôr zoberie z poľa úrodu.


