The weather in the Pittsburgh area over the last two weeks of February has been filled with colder than normal temperatures, snow, and freezing rain. Hoping that the Pittsburgh area weather by the time this publication reaches you in early April will be trending warmer, with sunshine, days with more daylight hours, and a greening of the landscape. I guess Punxsutawney Phil was correct with his prediction in early February of six more weeks of winter weather!

Some dates to remember in the month of April include April Fool's Day on April 1st, Federal Tax Day on April 15th, Good Friday on April 18th, Easter on April 20th, Earth Day on April 22nd, and Administrative Professionals Day on operations over the past year to KBRA April 23rd.

As we celebrate Easter on April 20th, on behalf of the Executive Officers, Board of Directors, and Home Office Staff, and my family, I would like to wish each of you a Blessed and Happy Easter as you gather for the holiday with your families. The Home Office will be closed for business on April 18th and April 21st so that our Home Office Staff may enjoy the holiday with their families. The Home Office will open for business on Tuesday, April 22nd.

The 2024 Annual Financial Statement of the National Slovak Society indicates that the Society had another successful year while growing in a controlled manner. Our Secretary-Treasurer/ CFO John Payerchin will provide details of the Statement elsewhere in this issue. Some highlights of NSS Operations long-term are underpinned by annuity for 2024 include the following. Net Income for the year was \$6,184,814, prior to capital and surplus adjustments. Admitted Assets increased to \$1,836,887,272. Surplus increased to

\$99,841,435, an increase of 5.25%. Total Adjusted Capital for the year increased \$8,651,121 to \$120,694,900, an increase of 7.76%. Total Adjusted Capital is used by regulators and rating agencies to judge the strength of our Society. It is calculated by adding the Surplus, Asset Valuation Reserve, and one-half of the dividend liability. The NSS Solvency Ratio, another metric used to indicate our financial strength, increased to 105.75 in 2024. NSS membership also increased in 2024 marking twenty years of continued growth! The NSS has grown over the past year in all aspects of our operation while our members have earned competitive yields on their annuities. The Board agent or Home Office Sales Represenof Directors kept the annuity crediting rates stable over the past year benefiting by email at jelliott@nsslife.org to start our annuity holders while increasing the metrics related to our financial strength. The higher crediting rates have reduced Net Income which is affected by the difference between the rate we credit on includes an adult category as part of our annuities and the rate we earn on our investment portfolio.

The NSS was contacted by our rating agency, Kroll Bond Rating Agency, in early December regarding our annual rating surveillance process. NSS Officers. Home Office Staff. and Society Advisors submitted documentation regarding all aspects of our through early February. On February 11th, the Executive Officers, National Sales Director, members of our actuarial firm Miller & Newberg, and our Asset Management Team AQS provided KBRA with a presentation highlighting our strengths and accomplishments over the complete the PVR Scholarship applicapast year. Following the presentation and the submission of additional documentation, KBRA's rating team issued the rating on February 28, 2025. The National Slovak Society KBRA Insurance Financial Strength Rating (IFSR) is BBB+. The Outlook was raised from Stable to Positive. KBRA's press release indicates, "The Outlook revision to Positive from Stable reflects the favorable long-term growth trends in earnings, capital growth, and strategic execution. Consistent profitability trends over the spread management, above-benchmark investment yields, and effective crediting rate adjustments largely mitigating disintermediation risks. New money and reinvestment rates have strength-

ened without compromising asset credit quality, allowing for competitive crediting and bonus rates while maintaining surplus growth." The rating surveillance report will be analyzed and used by the Board of Directors, the Executive Officers, and the NSS management team to continue to strengthen our operation.

A reminder that Federal income tax is due on Tuesday, April 15th. You have until April 15th to contribute to your current NSS IRA or open a new NSS IRA for the tax year 2024. Our current annuity crediting rate for the Preferred 8+ is 6.5 % for the first year and the Optimum 3 yield is 5.00% guaranteed for the first three years! Surplus grew by \$4,983,016 to \$99,841,435.

We continue to strive for growth while protecting our members and their financial futures. These numbers only show a fraction of the success of NSS. Our home office team continues to grow and remain ahead of the curve with industry trends, regulations, and training. It is hard to believe we are through the first quarter of 2025 already. The PVR Committee continues to work to reach our goal of \$2 million dollars

by the June 2026 convention. Life insurance Inheritance

Life insurance is purchased for a specific purpose or need. Some examples would be to pay for final expenses, mortgage, college expenses, retirement and create an income stream. Deducting a traditional IRA

A person may deduct their IRA contributions up until April 15th of this year for the 2024 tax year. There are rules that must be followed to claim a deduction. A person must have earned income and meet some income guidelines. Assuming eligibility, how does this work? A 50-year-old person makes an \$8,000 IRA contribution and based on their income they are in the 22% tax bracket. Multiply twenty-two times \$8,000 and this IRA saved them \$1,760 in taxes. Double that if they make a spousal contribution. In a sense, the government is helping to subsidize your retirement funds. And that is why at retirement age when you start to withdraw money from your IRA there are taxes due. The critical point is that money can be saved on taxes while building a retirement fund. April 15th is on a Tuesday this year. Contributions before April 15th can be for either the 2024 or 2025 tax year. We need to know that fact. After April 15th, all contributions will be for the 2025 tax year.

Personal Financial Planning

What are the basic steps to setting up a personal financial plan? There are a few steps to get started. First, evaluate where you are, list expenses and income. Next, set a goal. Be specific. I want to save \$10,000 within 2 years. Then devise a plan to help you get there. In this example, it may be necessary to save \$400 per month. - 3. All contestants must be members of the NSS Life as of April 15, 2025 or must have six months premium paid in advance at the time of entry. New bowlers must have bowled a minimum of 21 games as of March 15, 2025. Bowlers with no average see #7 below.
- 4. NSS Life adult members are required to maintain a minimum balance of \$300.00 in an annuity or have a permanent life insurance certificate, to qualify to participate in a NSS Life subsidized sporting event held on a national level i.e. National Bowling Tournament, National Golf Tournament, etc.

No one may bowl in this tournament except those originally entered before the tournament opens or such substitutes who may be authorized by the captain of a team or his appointee provided the individual whose name appears on the entry blank is unable for sufficient reason to attend the tournament at the time scheduled. The Bowling Committee shall have power as to the substitutes that are offered by the captain or his legalized representative, and if accepted, each substitute must 14. Assignment of Alleys - The Tournament Committee will make bowl each event under his full name and only at scheduled time in each event. The substitutes score and handicap from the said event will be used.
- 7. Any contestant whose current average as of March 15, 2025 of at least 21 games is ten pins or more above his highest average from the previous season must use his current average. HANDICAP - Handicap (Men) allowed will be 85% of the difference between 240 and last season's 2023-2024 highest sanctioned league average of at least 21 games. Bowlers who have no established average will use their highest sanctioned league average of at least 21 games as of March 15, 2025. Male bowlers who have no established average for this year or last year will be listed as 175 average and will be handicapped accordingly. If the bowler does not have a sanctioned average over the last two years, but has competed in the Joint Fraternal Tournament, the most recent 5 year history from the Joint Fraternal Tournaments will be used. Male bowlers with an average over 240 will receive no handicap and will bowl scratch in the tournament.

Handicap (Women) allowed will be 85% of the difference between 200 and last season's 2023-2024 who have no established average will use their highest sanctioned league average of at least 21 games as of March 15, 2025. Female bowlers who have no established average for this year or last year will be listed as 150 average and will be handicapped accordingly. If the bowler does not have a sanctioned average over the last two years, but has competed in the Joint Fraternal Tournament, the most recent 5 year history from the Joint Fraternal tournaments will be used. Female bowlers with an average over 200 will receive no handicap and will bowl scratch in the tournament.


Under no circumstances will handicaps be increased after participant has bowled.

Contestants in this tournament are not required to report any tournament prize winnings for the previous 12-month period.

- 8. FALSIFYING AVERAGES - PENALTY - The team captain is responsible for reporting all averages of the individual team members, and they are responsible to him. Should the Tournament Committee find at any time that the averages have been falsified, the team shall forfeit all claims for prize money as well as their entry fee and will be subject to disqualification and suspension from organized bowling. All prize winners are subject upon request to submit an affidavit of correct league averages.
- 9. Rerating of Bowlers According to USBC Rule No. 319 A-E, bowlers may be rerated by the Tournament Committee.

- 12. NO MONEY WILL BE REFUNDED. All prize fee money will be paid in prizes.
- 13. In the Doubles contest the names of both members of the team must be given, because entries with the word "Partner" will not be accepted. Entry blanks so compiled will be returned and the entry money retained until proper blank is received. If both entrants in the Doubles event appear when scheduled, it is understood that they must bowl as they have been entered on the original entry blank and no change in position will be allowed at any time after entry blank has been filed.
- up the alley assignments for all entrants in the Doubles, Singles and Team Events. Entrants in the Doubles and Singles Events are required to report fully 30 minutes prior to the time they are scheduled to bowl. Captains of teams must report their line-up at least 30 minutes before scheduled to bowl.
- 15. In the Doubles & Singles Events bowling entrants will bowl all six of their games on the same pair of lanes. Bowlers entered in the Singles Event only will be assigned to alleys by the Committee.
- 16. A team may use a name other than its league name for tournament entry without the payment of additional membership dues as formerly required.
- 17. Failure to use the correct average shall disqualify score if submitted average is lower than correct average thereby resulting in a lower classification or more handicap. Prize winnings shall be based on the submitted average if it is higher than the correct average. However, corrections in averages may be permitted up to the completion of the first game of a series. Bowlers must include a copy of their league average sheet with their application.

Bubbly Bath Fizzies

Bath time is about to get a whole lot more fun with these colorful homemade bath fizzies. Drop them in the tub and see how they start fizzing — while leaving your skin naturally soft and smooth.

Supplies:

- 2 teaspoons unsweetened lemon drink mix
- 1 teaspoon flour or cornstarch
- 4 teaspoons baby oil or mineral oil

Dancing Popcorn

Ingredients:

- 1 quart-size jar
- 1 tbsp. popcorn kernels
- Water

1 cup white vinegar 2-4 tbsp. baking soda

Spoon

Directions:

Fill the jar ³/₄ full of water. Add baking soda and stir until baking soda dissolves completely. Slowly add popcorn kernels 1 tablespoon at a time. Continue to add more if you want, however do not add more that ¹/₄ cup. Slowly pour in the vinegar. You may not need it all, and if you pour too much to fast you will end up with a volcano-like eruption! Observe your dancing popcorn!

Here's How it Works:

Baking soda is a bicarbonate and it's a base. Vinegar is an acetic acid, which of course is an acid. When these 2 combine a chemical reaction occurs. As a result of this chemical reaction, carbon dioxide gas is produced. When this reaction happens under water the carbon dioxide gas is trapped in bubbles which then collect on the popcorn kernels. When enough bubbles have collected the kernels begin to rise. When the bubbles reach the top of the jar and hit the air, the gas is released and the bubbles pop. Once a few bubbles have popped there's no longer enough gas to support the popcorn and it begins to sink. What makes it dance? The process repeats! As the kernel sinks, more bubbles start to collect and it rises once more. The popcorn will dance and dance until the reaction has released all the carbon dioxide. Want to make the experiment last longer? Just add more baking soda and vinegar!

Dinosaur Night Lights

Supplies

- 16 ounce plastic mason jar with lid
- Plastic plants/trees
- Small rocks
- Sand
- Flat glass marbles
- Moss
- Plastic dinosaurs
- Submersible candle lights

Craft tools


- Hot glue gun
- E6000 glue
- Scissors

Instructions

- 1. Turn the moss upside down and trace the mason jar lid with a black marker. Cut out the moss circle.
- 2. Cut a strip wide enough to cover the band of the jar lid.
- 3. Use hot glue to attach the moss to the lid.
- 4. Turn the lid upside down and use E6000 glue to attach the submersible light to the inside of the lid. Hot glue will not hold as well.
- 5. Allow to dry completely.
- 6. Add sand to the jar first.
- 7. Place flat glass marbles, rocks, plants, and dinosaurs inside the jar to create a terrarium. Add moss for a natural look.
- 8. Place the lid onto the jar.
- 9. Glue a few rocks and a dinosaur to the top of the jar lid.

Tips:

Because the items inside the jar are not glued in place, you can rearrange your terrarium anytime you like.


I know my dad always takes care of it but I wanted to do something myself this year.

PVR Fund News



Blessing of our Slovak Easter Dinner

One of the most solemn and ancient rituals observed by Slovaks the world over is the blessing of Easter foods. Early Sunday morning the girls and women prepare a basket of symbolic foods to be taken to church to be blessed and eaten to celebrate the great feast of Jesus Resurrection. Each basket is beautifully decorated and covered with a beautifully embroidered or crocheted cloth. A blessed candle is placed in the basket and lighted during the ceremony as a sign of "Christ the Light of the World" A traditional Slovak Easter Basket also includes:

COLORED EGGS /MALOVANÉ VAJIČKA - Brightly colored and decorated the eggs are symbolic of Jesus Resurrection from the tomb on Easter Sunday; and of new life.

EASTER BREAD /PASKA - This sweet, rich yeast bread is symbolic of Jesus the Bread of Life. The bread is often ornamented with a cross of dough in the center surrounded by a circle of plaited dough symbolizing the crown of thorns.

PASTRIES/KOLAČE - Specially baked holiday butter and egg rich pastries filled with fruits and nuts symbolizing • the many gifts from God and the sweetness of the resurrection.

SMOKED HAM, SAUSAGE AND BACON/ŠUNKA,

KLOBASA, SLANINA - These meat products symbolize the sacrificial animals of the old testament and the sacrifice of Jesus. Ham was the most popular main dish meat because of its richness and symbolized the great joy and abundance of the Easter celebration. Spicy pork sausage with a garlic flavor is indicative of God's favor and generosity. A piece of smoked bacon cured with spices is added to remind us of God's overabundance of mercy toward us.

EASTER CHEESE /SYREK/HRUTKA – Made from milk and eggs and shaped into a ball this bland but sweet tasting cheese is to remind us that as Christians we should use moderation in all aspects of our lives. **HORSERADISH CHREN** - Represents the bitter herbs used by the Hebrews during their flight from Egypt, and t he bitter herbs used during Jesus' final celebration of the Passover meal.

BUTTER /MASLO– Shaped into a lamb figure to remind us of the goodness of Christ that we should have toward all things.

SALT/SOL – Salt is blessed because it is a fundamental seasoning and preservative necessary to sustain life. It is also symbolic of prosperity and justice, for it is Christ who sustains us to eternal life. Of course regional differences both here in America and in Slovakia may dictate other various additions such as wine, vinegar, or veal. Remember, since all the foods are blessed none is to be wasted. One of the most prized possessions of many with roots in the Slavic countries of Eastern

Europe is the Easter basket cover. These covers usually have symbols related to the Resurrection and the celebration of Easter. In many families, the cover is passed from generation to generation. The most common element found on Easter basket covers is the cross, the symbol of the resurrection. Pussy willows, and other spring flowers, as well as kraslice are also used in the designs. Quite often, the cover will carry the message of the resurrection in the language of the owner. Embroidery is the most common method used for making these covers, because many become family heirlooms. The design variations are quite extensive, and seldom will you find two embroidered covers that are identical. Each cover makes a unique statement about the owner's heritage and beliefs. If you are lucky enough to have an Easter basket cover I hope you will use it to cover your basket and continue this special custom. By Sue Ondrejco

Easter Bunny Pretzels Ingredients

- 1 bag, 16 oz pretzel snaps
- 1 bag, 10 oz white chocolate melting wafers
- 1 bag, 10 oz M&Ms Spring Mix chocolate candies

Directions

Preheat the oven to 250 degrees F.

Using a sharp knife, cut one M&M in half for the bunny's ears. Use a black edible marker to draw a bunny face on the blank side of another M&M of the same color.

Place 8-10 pretzel snaps on a rimmed baking sheet. Place one melting wafer on the top in the center of each pretzel. Bake for 1-2 minutes until the chocolate just begins to melt.

Remove the baking sheet from the oven and place the M&M with the bunny face in the bottom center of the chocolate wafer. Place the two M&M halves above the single M&M to form the bunny ears.

Set aside to cool and dry. Repeat with all remaining M&Ms.

Slavic Studies Reception at the University of Pittsburgh

NSS SCHOLARSHIP FOR SENIOR MEMBERS A NATIONAL SLOVAK SOCIETY FRATERNAL **PROGRAM**

~ PURPOSE ~

To encourage our older members to continue their education and to make fuller use of their leisure time.

~ MEMBER ELIGIBILITY ~

Any life insurance or annuity member, fifty-five (55) years or older, who has enrolled and successfully completed a continuing education or adult education course. Members may submit up to two (2) applications in one calendar year.

~ COURSE ELIGIBILITY ~

Vocational schools, community colleges and universities offer a variety of short-term courses which may include areas like computer training, cake decorating, photography, landscaping, small engine repair, ballroom dancing, etc. This program does not cover courses that assist you to maintain your current full or part-time job. (Example: We will not reimburse life insurance or real estate agents who take continuing education credits to maintain their licenses.)

~PROCEDURE ~

Members should enroll and pay for the course of their choice. Once the member has finished the class, he/ she must submit an application, along with verification that the class was successfully completed, to the Home Office for approval by a National Officer. If the scholarship application is approved, the NSS will reimburse the full tuition for the course up to, but not to exceed, one hundred dollars (\$100.00)

Attention!!! High School Seniors Deadline: May 1, 2025

NSS is accepting requests for applications for the PVR Scholarship. The scholarship is for \$500 per year for a total grant of \$2,000. Below are the guidelines that you must meet in order to be eligible.

The student must be a member of the National Slovak Society (NSS) for a minimum of two (2) years prior to receiving a PVR Scholarship Grant. Membership will be verified by the Home Office.

The minimum amount of insurance required for eligibility is \$10,000 of **PERMANENT** life insurance or \$5,000 of annuity deposits. The insurance must be in force at time of application and must be maintained throughout the scholarship period. A reminder for those students already receiving the PVR Scholarship, don't forget to request a copy of your transcripts be sent to the Home Office at the end of the semester to make sure you are still eligible to receive your next installment of your grant.
